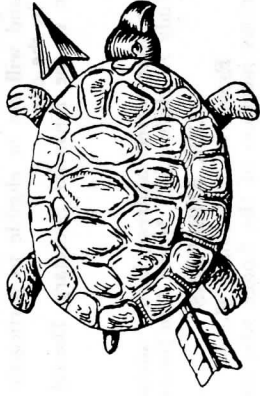

## OUR AMBITIONS

### RENOVATING OF LODGE HOUSE

Last summer various members of the Lodge who attended camp and those who visited camp were not impressed with the condition and appearance of the Lodge House. Many discussions were held and suggestions were made, which resulted in the decision to renovate the building.

At the Annual Meeting the Lodge approved the plans as proposed by the Chairman of House-building Committee, Thomas G. Cairns.

The House-building Committee has been functioning and are now proceeding to carry out their plans, which include lining the building, rebuilding fire-place, building of an addition for a kitchen, repairing of porch, installation of electricity, replacing canvas cots with double-deck beds and furnishing the house with suitable furniture.

It is planned to start this work in the early spring and complete it in June.

## RITUAL AND INITIATIONS

There were several important matters decided at the Grand Lodge meeting in Philadelphia last November.

One which will be of interest to our membership is the combining of the present First and Second Degrees and creation of a new Second Degree. It is the plan to give the present First Degree at camp and the present Second Degree in the city probably in October. A candidate will not be a member until he receives the present First and Second Degrees.

It may be that the new Second Degree will be ready by camp time. If so, it will probably be conferred at camp on deserving members.

Those members who were taken in last year will be eligible for the Second Degree upon their return to camp after complying with the requirements.

Last year the Ordeal at camp was changed considerably and proved quite valuable by instilling in the member a better understanding of Lodge principles and ideals. This Ordeal is to be improved still further, and the Ritual and Initiation Committee have this under consideration.

## AT CAMP

It is being planned to make Wilmachtendiek more effective during the summer camping season. At camp the Lodge should function at its peak. Considerable thought is being given to improving the program. Suggestions from the members will be gladly received.

## MEETINGS

It is necessary that our meetings, both at camp and in the city, be interesting and worthwhile. A special effort is being made to provide an attractive program that will insure members of an enjoyable evening.

Members arriving late at meetings may be required to remain outside until admitted by the Sergeant-at-Arms. Membership card must be shown and password given properly before admittance will be permitted. The participation in and discussion of the question on the floor is open to all members and is a privilege every member should exercise.

It is desirable that arrow hands be worn at meetings. These may be purchased from Chairman of Sales Committee, Rudy A. Heller.

## LODGE INSIGNIA

Members of the Lodge in good standing are permitted and encouraged to wear on the right pocket of their Scout shirt a new insignia, identifying them with Unami Lodge, Wilmachtendiek W. W. This insignia will be official and will be on sale very shortly.

## LODGE HOUSE RESERVATIONS

Any member in good standing eighteen years or older may have the use of the Lodge House at Treasure Island. Application for its use must be made in advance to the Chairman of House Committee, Charles Pilkington, 844 South 58th Street.

If a member is not of the specified age, he may apply for reservation, providing a responsible adult leader accompanies the party.

The house will be closed for renovation early in the spring so reservations will not be able to be made after March 15th.

## LIFE MEMBERSHIP

Several members have availed themselves of the opportunity of becoming Life members of the Lodge by purchasing a Life Membership for ten dollars. This assures the individual of being a member for life without payment of any further dues. All notices and mail matter are sent to Life Members. This investment will prove a worthwhile one.

## PINS, EMBLEMS, ETC.
