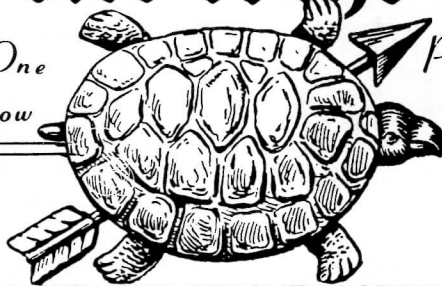

TURSI CHOSEN FOR SECOND TERM

On Sunday morning, September 17, over 250 expectant, wondering Arrowmen sat in the Nesbitt Dining Hall of Hart Scout Reservation, waiting impatiently for an extremely important announcement. After a few minutes, Glenn Berman, Chairman of the Lodge Nomination and Elections Committee, ascended to the podium. Glenn formally announced the names of the new Lodge treasurer, secretary and vice-chiefs for 1980. Then after a brief pause, Mr. Berman announced that the Chief-Elect of Unami Lodge for 1980 is Michael Tursi. Immediately cheers broke out throughout the Nesbitt Dining Hall.

The cheers were for a good reason. This will be Brother Tursi's second term as the chief executive officer of Unami. In June, 1979 Michael assumed the weighty responsibilities of Lodge Chief after the resignation of Robert Novak. Mike Tursi has never been a stranger to the operations and procedures of the Order of the Arrow in Philadelphia Council. In addition to serving as Woodland Chapter Chief, New Members' Reception Chairman, Lodge Vice-Chief, Ordeal Chairman and Summer Camp Honorsmaster, Michael has contributed to practically every lodge committee and activity. As chief for the latter half of 1978, Michael was also an active voting member of the Philadelphia Council Camping Committee and a youth representative on the Council Executive Board.

Elected as Vice-Chiefs for 1980 at the weekend were Martin Healey and Leon Psculkowski. Brother Healey is a former Polaris Chapter Chief, Fall Fellowship Event Director, and currently serves as Lodge Finance Chairman. Martin will be assuming the duties of Lodge First Vice-Chief in 1980. Serving as Second Vice-Chief next year will be Leon Psculkowski. Leon is presently a Vice-Chief in Wissahickon Valley Chapter.

The new Lodge Secretary for 1980 is George Farrell, Jr. Currently serving as Polaris Chapter Chief, George has also been a Chapter Vice-Chief, editor of The Polaris Stargazer, and Lodge Service Chairman.

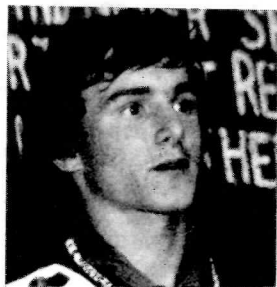

DECEMBER 26, 1979

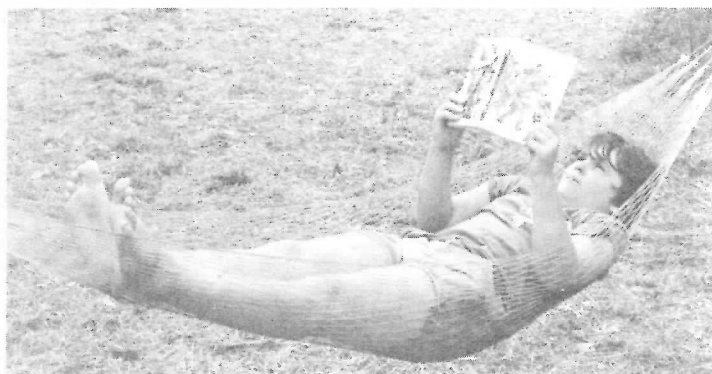

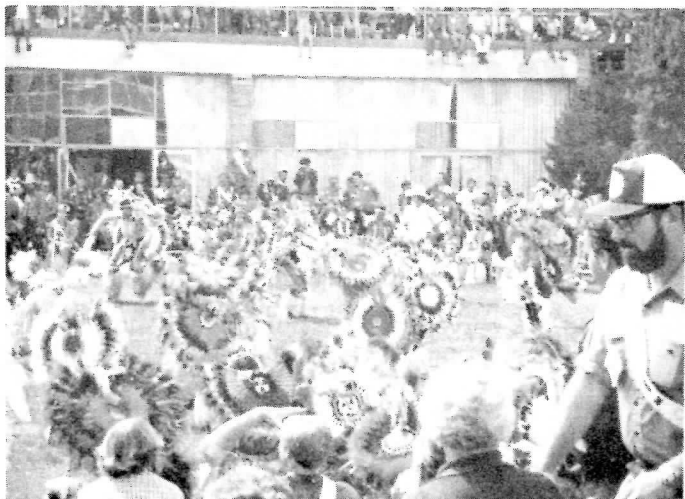
CHALLENGE



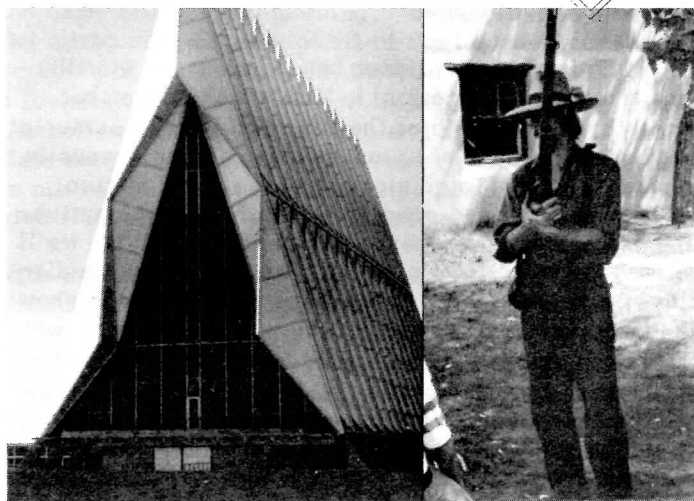
That was the theme of the 1979 National Order of the Arrow Conference held at Colorado State University in Ft. Collins, Col. from August 13-17. The biennial gathering was attended by over 4,400 Arrowmen from every Lodge in the Nation. Unami was represented by 11 delegates (2 of whom, Dr. Marv Gershenfeld and Dr. Lynn Home served on the Conference Medical Staff.) Other Arrowmen from Unami who attended were Dave Sirken, Mike Tursi, Sid Weitzman, Al Barrish, Al Trachtenberg, Jeff Steinberg, Carl Clyde, Glenn Berman and Dave Mest.



During the morning, each delegate attended two training seminars on such topics as: Lodge/Chapter Management, Lodge Finances, Indian Dances, Induction Enrichment, Lodge/Council Relations, The Advisor's Role, and Creative Programming. Over 300 youth and adult conducted these sessions including our own Glenn Berman who ran a session entitled "The Arrowman's Role in His Unit."



The afternoons were filled with lively and challenging recreational activities including Olympic Competitions, Ceremonial Team Competitions, Swimming, Tennis and, of course, patch trading. A Display Area was set up in the huge "Moby" Gym in which Unami erected a booth on Lodge Publications and Public Relations.



Each evening, all Arrowmen attended exciting and captivating multi-media stage shows in the Moby Gym. These shows starred none other than "Kermit the Frog", the National Chief and Vice-Chief, and the Order's Founders, Dr. Goodman and Col. Edson, Miss Teenage America, and Miss Indian America.



On Thursday, all Lodges participated in the "Rocky Mountain Extravaganza", a huge carnival of displays and give-aways and food very similar to the Fellowship feasts of our Section Conclaves. At this carnival, Unami gave out souvenir soil samples from the hallowed ceremonial grounds on Treasure Island, Philadelphia Key Chains, and Pennsylvania buttons.



THE 1979 NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Truly the highlight of the 1979 Conference was Unami's traditional private audience with the Founders of Our Order, Dr. E. Urner Goodman and Colonel Carrol A. Edson. (We were also fortunate to have our Founders charming wife, Mrs. Goodman attend). Mike Tursi and Dave Sirken presented the First Unami members with



our Lodge History Book, "Where-to-go-Camping" Book, neckerchief and delegation T-shirt and hat. The delegation and our esteemed guests engaged in an enjoyable discussion about the original ceremonies and the early days of our Order.



The conference closing show on Friday morning was also the launch of a new program of Arrowmen's personal responsibilities and the delegates were enthralled by an inspirational closing address by Dr. Goodman.



After the Conference, Unami's delegation did a little touring in Colorado and New Mexico. Among the points of interest visited were The Garden of the Gods, Pike's Peak, The U.S. Air Force Academy, a great show by the Koshare Indians, and of course the greatest Scout ranch of all, Philmont.



The 1981 National Conference will be held at Austin, Texas and the one in 1983 is going to be held in the Northeast Region of the country for the first time. Make your plans now to attend both of these great gatherings of the nation's Arrowmen!



BROTHERHOOD

Dear Brothers of Unami Lodge:

Some members of the Order may have heard the expression "Seal The Bond" and have felt a little in the dark as to its exact meaning. "Sealing the Bond" means reaffirming your faith in the high ideals of Wiemachtendienk and becoming Brotherhood. The requirements for Brotherhood are as follows:

- 1) Be an active Ordeal member of the Lodge for at least ten (10) months.
- 2) Remain registered in Scouting
- 3) Have your current dues paid
- 4) Write a letter to the Lodge Secretary explaining in your own words what you think the Obligation means and how you have fulfilled and how you are going to continue to fulfill your Obligation at the Lodge, Chapter, or Troop level.
- 5) Learn the Lodge Song (p.139 in the O.A. Handbook, 1977 edition), Obligation (p.8), Sign of membership, handclasp, and admonition.
- 6) Learn the answers to the Brotherhood Review Questions on PP.66-69 in the O.A. Handbook.
- 7) A short two-hour Service project is suggested, but is not mandatory.



Brotherhood reviews and inductions are held every year at the Spring Service and Fall Fellowship Weekends, Camporees and at Summer Camp.

LETTER

TO THE EDITOR

Now What Do I Do? by Glenn Berman

This question is commonly asked by many Arrowmen soon after their induction. Both youth and adult, old and new Brothers may pose this question at one time or another. We hope to answer this in a 2-part article. The 2nd part will appear in the next issue of The Voice Of The Turtle.

"How does the Order of the Arrow encourage me to provide greater service to my own unit?"

The third purpose of the O.A. is: "To promote Scout camping, which relates its greatest effectiveness as a part of the unit's camping program, and to help strengthen the district and council camping program both year around and in the summer camp, as directed by the camping committee of the council."

One way is given right there in the words of the O.A. Handbook — "PROMOTE CAMPING." This can be done in a few ways: by word of mouth; by practicing outdoor skills with your unit; family outings (picnics, hikes, canoe trips); or even by serving as a Summer Camp Staff member. Also, and even more important, be sure to conduct a camp promotion pitch and information session at one of your meetings.

Remember, you set an example in your unit! Scouts look up to you all of the time for guidance and leadership. Get to activities and meetings on time, wear a proper uniform proudly, act mature and most of all, be helpful.

Remember — you were not elected into the O.A. so much for what you have done in the past, but for what you are expected to do in the future!

These are just a few suggestions of the ways in which you can help your unit as an Arrowman. In Part II, we'll share some ideas on how you can contribute to the Chapter, Lodge and Council through your involvement in the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service.
