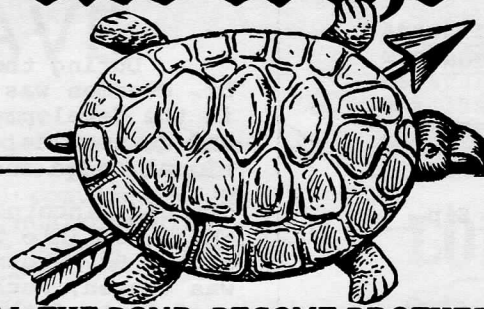

DR. GOODMAN DIES AT 88

Early in the morning on Thursday, March 13, 1980, Dr. E. Urner Goodman, the Founder of the Order of the Arrow, died at the age of 88. Dr. Goodman had been ill for a few weeks and spent his last days at Lennox Hill Hospital in New York City.

Dr. Goodman was best known for his major role in the founding of an honor society for Scout Campers, the Wiemachtendienk W.W. While serving as Camp Director at Treasure Island Scout Camp during the summer of 1915, Dr. Goodman, and his Assistant Camp Director, Carroll A. Edson were looking for a way to recognize those scouts who best exemplified the Scout Oath and Law in their daily actions. Dr. Goodman asked the tropps camping on the island to nominate the scouts who best fit this description for induction into a secret society based on the lore and tradition of the Delaware Indians who once lived in the area. The purpose of this "Phi Betta Kappa" of the camp, as Dr. Goodman put it, was "to crystallize the scout habit of helpfulness into a life purpose of leadership in service to others". During that first summer, 23 young men were recognized for their outstanding achievements and exemplary leadership. Since 1915, the Wiemachtendienk W.W., now known as The Order of the Arrow, has grown into a national camping and service society with over 400 local O. A. Lodges with over 200,000 active members in every Scout Council throughout the country.

Dr. Goodman's first, and somewhat unexpected, contact with the fledgling scouting movement came in 1911 when he was asked by a young boy in his Tioga section of Philadelphia, to become the Scoutmaster of what was to become Troop #1. That young scout was Gilbert Talmadge who has been a life-long friend of Dr. Goodman ever since. In addition to his volunteer role, Dr. Goodman became a very noted professional scouter and served as Camp Director of Treasure Island, and as Council Scout Executive of the Philadelphia and Chicago Area Councils. Our founder later served as the National Program Director of the Boy Scouts of America.

UNAMI CELEBRATES 65TH

Unami Lodge and the Order of the Arrow will celebrate 65 years of Cheerful Service this year. To commemorate this event we are holding an Anniversary Weekend at Treasure Island, our birthplace, on July 12th and 13th, 1980.

Highlights of this event will include: tours of the island, a reenactment of the Original Ordeal Ceremony, our 1980 Vigil Call-out, a birthday party on Saturday evening, and a rededication ceremony Sunday morning. Other activities to be held throughout the day are: swimming, boating, a B-B shoot, T-shirt silk screening, patch and memorabilia displays and slide shows. The Frontier Chapter Dance Team, as well as dance teams from other Lodges, will be performing. On Saturday evening there will be a spectacular fireworks display.

We have invited many of our National and Council Scouting Officials to be with us for this special occasion. A number of our city, state, and United States Government Officials will also be joining us.

The price for this weekend is \$9.00. This fee includes: Saturday dinner and snack, Sunday breakfast, the NEW (3rd edition) Unami Lodge History Book, event patch and special handouts. You will also be able to purchase the 65th Anniversary pocketflap and other new Lodge items during the weekend.

During the early days of our Order, Dr. Goodman was an ever-present driving force in the development of service, organization, and ceremonies. He organized the Grand National Lodge and was responsible for the later

official incorporation of the Order of the Arrow into the National Camping Program of the Boy Scouts of America. Dr. Goodman was chosen, much to his chagrin, as the first recipient of the Third Degree later to be called the Vigil Honor. Dr. Goodman had felt it more appropriate for a deserving boy to be the first recipient of this honor.

Upon his retirement as a professional, Dr. Goodman and his charming wife, Louise, traveled around the world, visiting friends and diplomats and sharing American Scouting in every country that they visited. Dr. Goodman befriended many internationally prominent leaders and businessmen and was also a close personal friend of Scouting's Founder, Lord Baden-Powell.



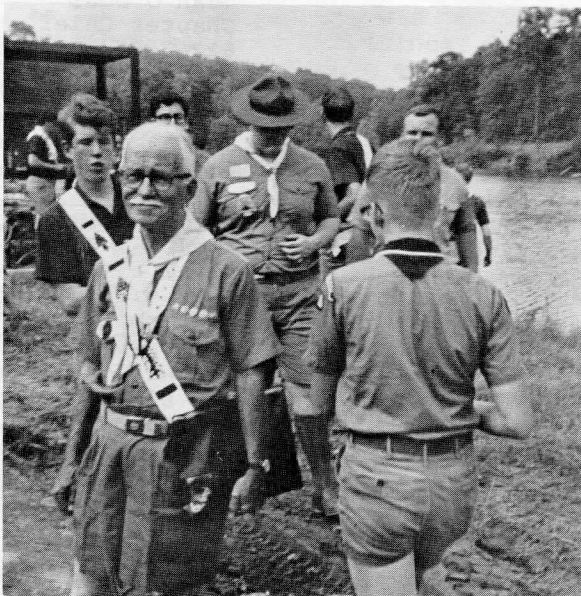
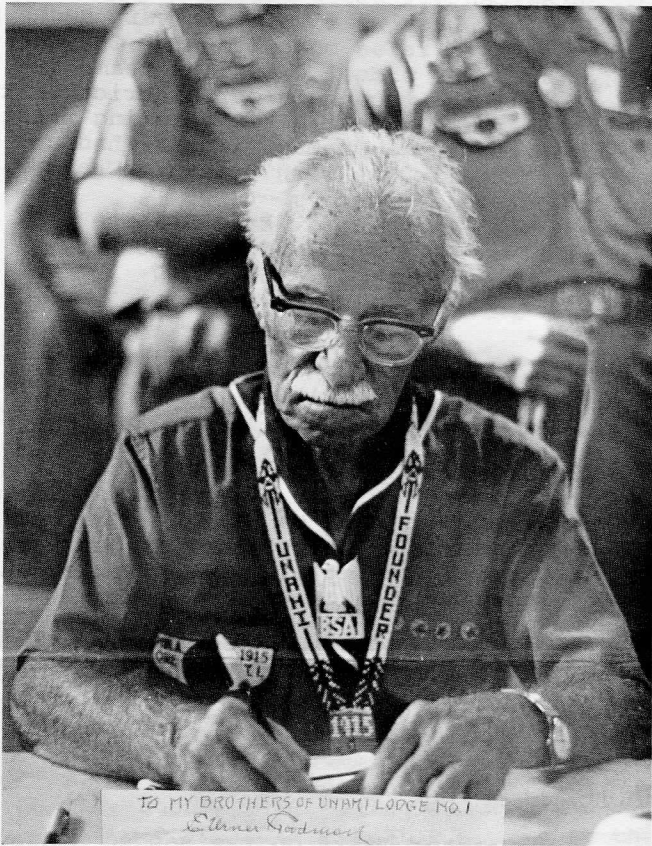
Dr. Goodman especially exemplified the twelfth point of the Scout Law, "A Scout is Reverent". Our founder was extremely active in a multitude of church-related organizations and youth programs. His life was truly one committed to Cheerful Service.

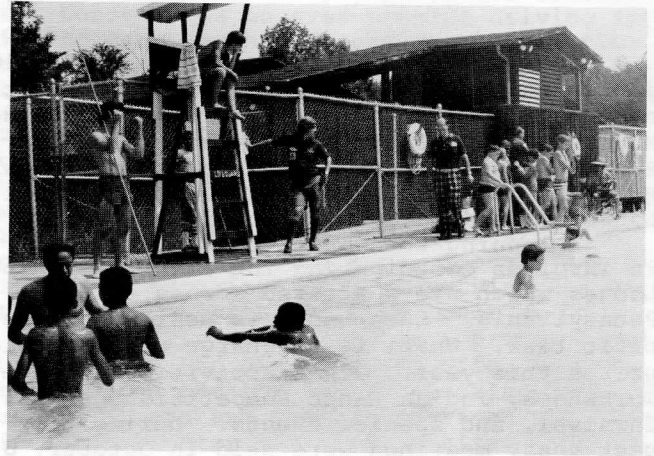
Unami was fortunate to be able to be with Dr. Goodman when he spoke at our 64th Annual Dinner last December, and when the Unami delegation met with Urner, his wife, and Col. Edson at the 1974 National Order of the Arrow Conference in Colorado. Dr. Goodman spent the last years of his full and active life in Penney Hills, Florida, near Miami.

Dr. Goodman is survived by his wife, Louise, his son Theodore, and his daughter, Mrs. Anne Kapell. A private funeral was held on March 16 and a memorial service was conducted in Florida on April 6th. In honor of Dr. Goodman, the flags at the Philadelphia Scout Service Center were flown at half-mast.

Unami Lodge and the entire Order of the Arrow will truly miss our beloved founder, Dr. E. Urner Goodman. Arrowmen all over the world will long remember him for the outstanding contributions which he has made in the service of the youth of our nation.

SUMMER CAMP

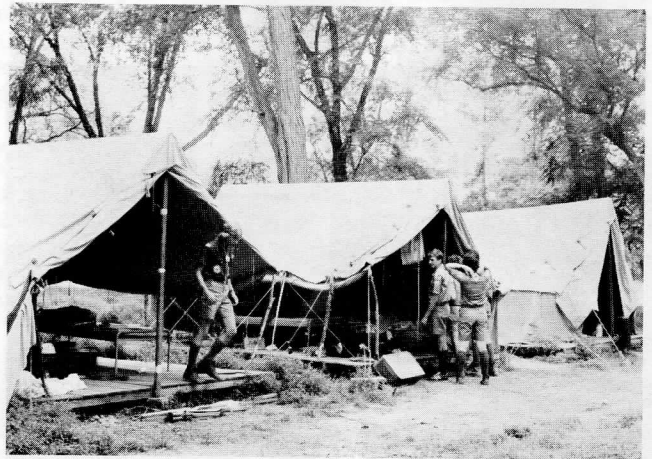

On June 13th, 14th, and 15th, 285 delegates, representing the nine Lodges of Northeast Region, Section 5-A will converge on Hawk Mountain Scout Camp for an annual training event. The Conclave is being hosted by Hawk Mountain Council, Kittating Lodge #5. Unami Lodge is sending 33 delegates.

Planning the Conclave is not easy as it involves coordinating the efforts of nine Lodges which are scattered across eastern Pennsylvania. Each Lodge is assigned a specific task. Unami is in charge of discussion groups this year. Other activities include: workshops, Indian Dance Competition, shows, Carnival, and special events. During the past year, meetings were held in October, January, and March to coordinate the Conclave.

The purpose of the Conclave is training. Each Lodge is assigned a quota of delegates which ranges from 10 to 45. Upon arrival, each delegate receives a training manual which contains programs, menus, workshop and discussion material and a short background on each Lodge. In our section, each delegate must attend one workshop, one discussion group and the Forum with a guest (this year it's our National Chief, Jeff Hermann).

The remaining portion of the Conclave is spent enjoying different activities. There will be swimming, boating, volleyball, rifleing and much more. Of course, a popular "past time" is watching the Indian Dance Competition (last year we placed 2nd). On

Saturday night a carnival is being held. There will be booths demonstrating Scout skills and others that are just fun.

A Conclave is fun and educational. Each of our delegates will bring back some new ideas for the Lodge and our Chapters to use. If you've never been to one, next year's will be held on the 2nd weekend in June. Plan to go!
