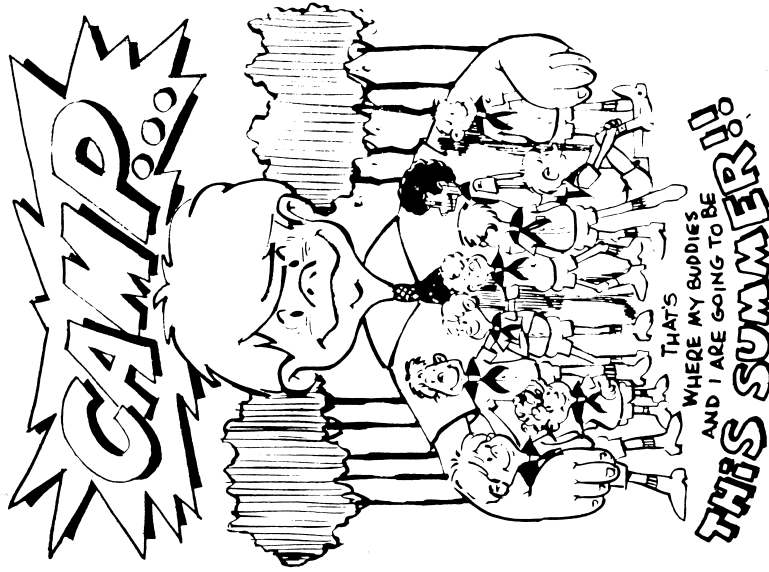

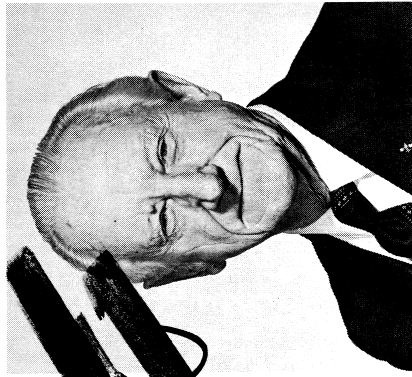

BADEN-POWELL BILL



William Hillcourt, retired director of Program Resources of the Boy Scouts of America, and a contributing editor of Boys' Life magazine, has written handbooks for Scoutmasters, boy leaders, and Scouts. His articles on Scoutcraft subjects are widely read.

Born in Denmark, Mr. Hillcourt is now an American citizen. He was a Scout and patrol leader in his native land and advanced to the Danish equivalent of Eagle Scout.

His interest in science led him to study the field of pharmacy in which he received a Master of Science degree. His interest in writing led to a career as author of books on camping and outdoor life, and his interest in Scouting led to his membership on the National Council staff of the Boy Scouts of America.

The organization selected him to write the Handbook for Patrol Leaders, a book for boy leaders, that has been translated into several languages. He also authored the Boy Scout Handbook, the basic manual of the movement, and the Scoutmaster's Handbook.

Mr. Hillcourt has written extensively on Scouting subjects for Boys' Life, the magazine in which he became popular as "Green Bar Bill." He is author of Field Book of Nature Activities and Conservation and of one dozen other books. One of his recent works -- Baden-Powell: The Two Lives of a Hero -- the definitive biography of the Founder of the Boy Scout movement--was published simultaneously in the United States and Great Britain in September 1964. His most recent book is Norman Rockwell's World of Scouting, a review of the vast treasury of Scouting's greatest artist. William Hillcourt is also presently working on the biography of the Founder of the Order of the Arrow, Dr. E. Urner Goodman.

He is an outstanding speaker on all phases of Scouting, outdoor living and world traveling. He has traveled in all of our 50 states and in 43 foreign countries on numerous tours of Europe and around the world. He has participated in 10 world jamborees and in all national jamborees of the Boy Scouts of America.

He has been honored by Scout associations around the world for his work, most recently by the Boy Scouts of Japan who presented him with the Hawk Award and by the British Scouts Association which awarded him its highest recognition, the Silver Wolf, the British equivalent of the American Boy Scout movement's Silver Buffalo Award. He is also the recipient of five George Washington Honor Medal Awards, presented by Freedom's Foundation of Valley Forge.

William Hillcourt was originally inducted as a member of Unami, and in 1976 the Lodge bestowed upon him the Vigil Honor.

Dear Brothers of Unami Lodge:

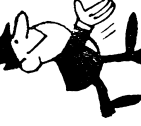

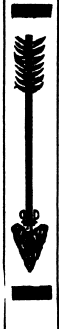

BROTHERHOOD



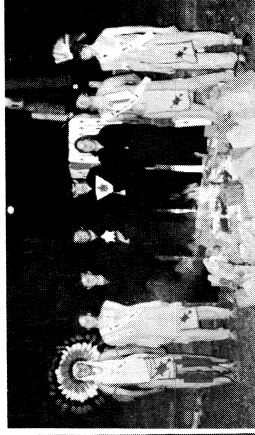
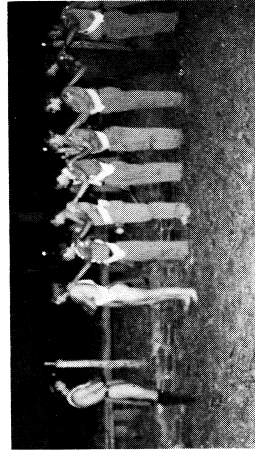

The Fall Fellowship held on October 21, 22, and 23 at Hart truly filled Unami's capacity for cheerful service while at the same time being fun as Arrowmen.

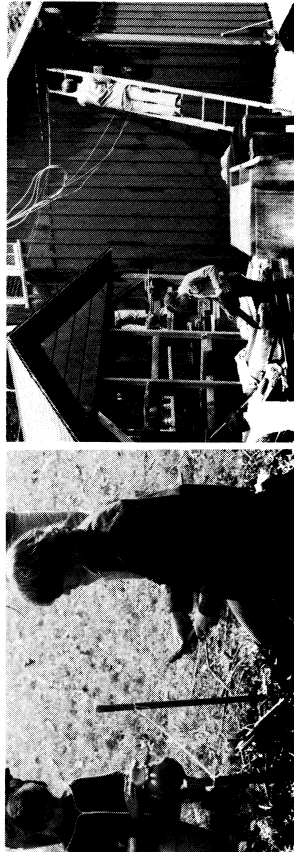

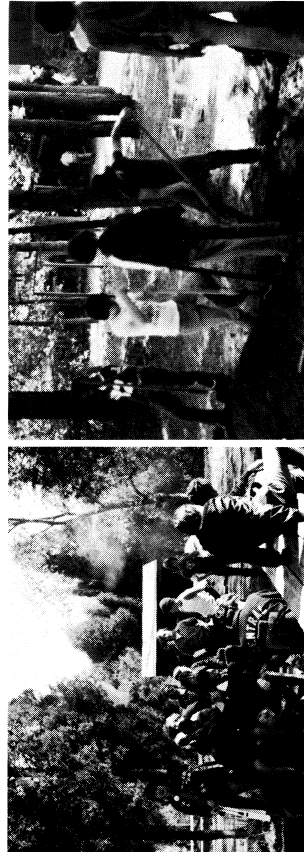
LODGE MEMBERSHIP
