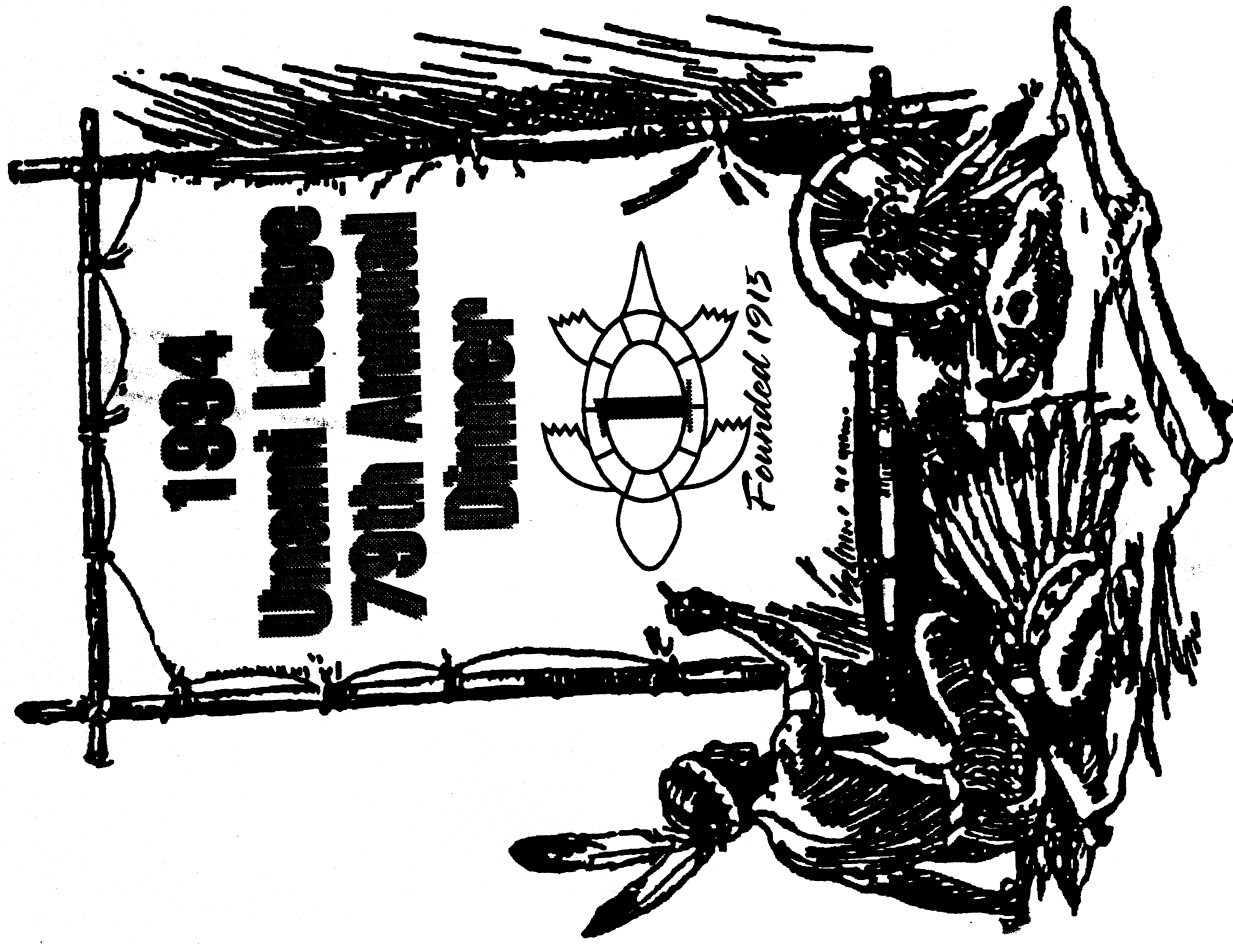

DUTIES OF THE LODGE OFFICERS

Chief -

- Is the Chief Executive officer of the Lodge.
- Is the primary representative of the Lodge at Order of the Arrow and other Scouting events.
- Is the chairman of the Executive Committee.
- Appoints all Lodge standing and special committee Chairmen according to the Lodge Bylaws.

Vice - Chiefs -

- The First Vice - Chief shall assume the Chairmanship of the Chief in his absence.
- The First Vice - Chief shall assume all powers and responsibilities of the Chief in case of the Chief illness, other disability, death, prolonged absence, resignation, or removal from office.
- Both Vice - chiefs shall act on assignment of the Chief and shall be responsible to him.
- Their general duties shall be to coordinate the operation of the Lodge. While they oversee committees, they should not chair committees.
- They shall be members of the Finance Committee.

Secretary -

- Shall store and distribute minutes, records, rules, etc.
- Shall serve on the publications Committee, Rules and Procedures, and Membership Committees.
- Shall be responsible for the maintenance of the membership records. He shall keep such records and materials as will allow information, publication, and the like to be mailed to each member.
- Shall do official Lodge and Executive Committee correspondence.
- Shall take minutes of the Lodge Executive Committee Meetings.
- Shall perform other duties, consistent with his office, as assigned by the Chief.

Treasurer -

- Shall be responsible for all monies received and deposited with the proper Council authorities.
- Shall purchase and sell such properties as are approved by the Lodge Executive Committee, under the specifications as are made by the Finance Committee, if any.
- Shall secure such records and information as are required by the Executive and Finance Committees.
- Shall be a member of the Finance Committee.
- Shall perform other duties, consistent with his office, as assigned by the Chief.

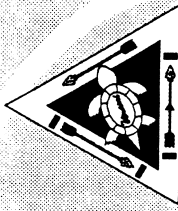

GEORGE H. KELLER AWARD

The George H. Keller Award recognizes the chapter which had the best camp promotion efforts during the year. The award honors George Keller for his lifetime of service to Philadelphia Council and Unami Lodge One, and his belief in the importance of Scout camping. As a Professional Scouter he served as a District Executive and as an assistant to the Director of Camping. He was Treasure Island Camp Director, Chairman of the Council Camping Committee and remained a member of the camping committee until his death. He was a member of the Council Executive Board. George Keller was Unami Lodge Chief and a Vigil Honor member of the Order of the Arrow. He served as Chief of the Fire for Vigil ceremonies for many years. He was honored with the Unami Lodge Founders Award. A plaque was erected in his honor at the Treasure Island ceremonial grounds, George H. Keller was one of Philadelphia Council's and Unami Lodge's most dedicated Scouters.

Keller Award Requirements

This award has been developed by the Camp Promotions Committee of the Lodge to be presented to the Chapter with the best camp promotions efforts for the year. It is designed to encourage the Chapter Camp Promotions Committee to increase their promotion of Scout Camping in each District. Points are given for contacting Packs and Troops to set up visitations, and for the visit. The Chapter also receives points for the number of Troops that attend Camp and earn the National Camping Award.

LOUIS R. SPEALLER AWARD

The Louis R. Spealler Award is presented annually to the two chapters which have shown the most improvement during the year. The award honors Lou Spealler for his lifetime of service to Philadelphia Council and Unami Lodge One. Lou Spealler was a member of the Treasure Island camp staff where he served as aquatics director. He was the Treasure Island camp director in the early 1950s, where as "Uncle" Lou he introduced the T.I. experience to thousands of campers of all ages. He oversaw the finances and food handling of both Hart and T.I. and served on the Council Camping Committee for many years. Lou Spealler was a Vigil Honor member of the Order of the Arrow and served as Chief of the Fire for Vigil ceremonies for many years. Louis R. Spealler was one of Philadelphia Council's and Unami Lodge's giants.

The Spealler Award Requirements

The Spealler Award is given by the two Lodge Vice-Chiefs to the two Chapters that have the best Chapter program that year. The Chapters must have a general business meeting and Chapter Executive meeting. The Chapters also receive points for sending representatives to their District roundtable, assisting the District in activities, attending Lodge Executive meetings, Lodge activities, and having their own activities and special meetings. Additional points are given for camp promotion, unit elections and publications efforts. At each Lodge Executive meeting the Chapter Chief must submit an application with the information from the previous month.

CEREMONIAL GROUNDS

This year the Ceremonial Grounds Committee helped to make the grounds one step closer to the high standards of Unami Lodge. First we identified the problems with the grounds and then set out to rectify them.

Special thanks go out to the arrowmen of Troop 385, Delaware Chapter, for their help with the trail signs at HART this summer. Also "This Old Camp", the Fall Fellowship Ordeal Candidates, and to all the others that helped replace the candle posts at Hart.

We are looking to expand our efforts dramatically and complete the repairs at both grounds in the future. This project is no easy undertaking! It requires thought, organization, and plenty of man power. It is an Ordeal. We need your help! Were looking for a few good Arrowmen!

If this project is ever going to get finished then we need some concern and enthusiasm from our members. We are the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service. The ones who inducted you need you. Who among you will go? Allowat Sakima, Mateu, Nutiket and Kichkinet need your help to preserve and optimize the mystique of the ceremonial grounds of the Order of the Arrow. If you decided to master every challenge faithfully, if you accept the full project, then please help to preserve the grounds for future Arrowmen as others have done for you.

CALENDAR YEAR CHANGE

At the Spring Service Weekend the youth members present discussed and voted upon a measure to change the Lodge Operational Calendar Year from a January 1st through December 31st structure to a September 1st through August 31st structure. This change in operations will take effect on September 1, 1995. The Lodge Officers recently elected at the Fall Fellowship Weekend will take office on January 1, 1995 but their term will only run until August 31, 1995. Therefore, the structure of when things will take place during the Lodge Year will be changed. The most important change is that Lodge Officers will be elected at the Spring Service Weekend beginning with the upcoming weekend on May 19-21, 1995. This means that those officers who will take office on September 1, 1995 will be those elected at the upcoming Spring Weekend. Many decisions on other operational items such as when to pay dues for the 1995-96 year, when to hold the annual Vigil Induction, as well as the answering of the question of should the Annual Dinner date be moved in 1995, have yet to be determined by the Lodge Executive Committee. Look for an official announcement of decisions about these as well as other operational questions in the first Voice of the Turtle of 1995.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT

Over the years the Lodge has had its ups and downs when it comes to annual membership as the graph below demonstrates. In 1993 however, Unami Lodge reached an all time low of 536 members, the lowest number in 10 years. Unami has not seen numbers this low since 1984 when membership was down to 727 members. Since then membership has not gone below 700 until 1993. The Lodge needs your help to turn around the current trend. First we need you to help register those members who have forgotten to do so over the past few years. Please remember that everyone must be registered with the Boy Scouts of America through the Philadelphia Council in order to register with Unami Lodge. Secondly, the Lodge needs you to help back at your Troops to help Scouts reach First Class and also to encourage an annual unit election for Order of the Arrow membership. A positive growth in membership will only occur if you get involved by paying your dues and in helping encourage one other person who has not registered in the last 3 years. The Lodge is aware of problems that have occurred recently with incorrect mailing lists and dues cards not being sent to those who have paid their dues. We apologize for the inconvenience and we would like to reassure you that we have taken steps to correct these problems and it has gotten better. However, there is a long way to go, so please bear with us and do not give up hope - instead give us another chance.

For fear he'll go the self same way.

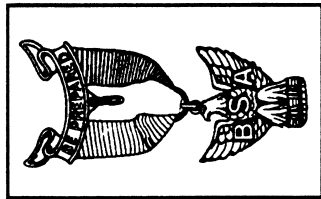
I can not once escape his eyes,
