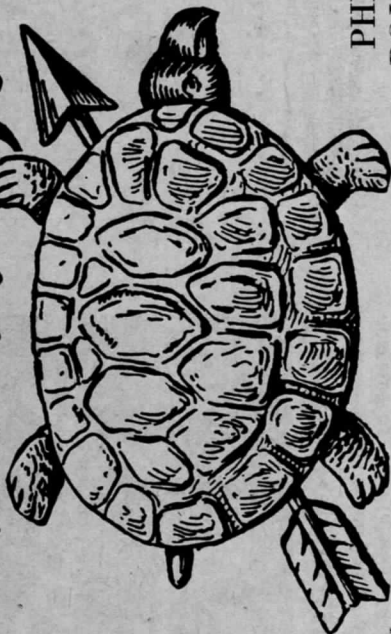

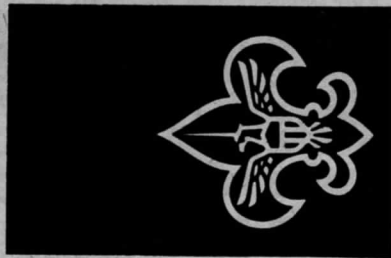

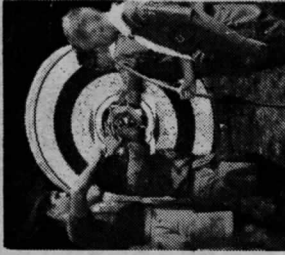

Aqua Scouts — Hart Scout Reservation August 21-27, 1977. The cost \$55.00. \$5.00 reservation fee is due NOW. You will be able to further develop your Aquatics skills. On this great weeklong adventure, you will also go on a camping/canoing trip down the Delaware River. You must have earned the canoeing merit badge to go on the canoe trip. You may also earn the swimming, lifesaving, rowing, canoeing, and small boat sailing merit badges in addition to the mile swim award and Lifeguard B.S.A.

Troop Leader Development — Hart Scout Reservation July 17-24, 1977. The cost \$55.00. It's a chance to develop your leadership skills. Learn the skills here to go back and use in your own troop. This course is recommended for all senior patrol leaders, patrol leaders, and members of the Leadership Corps. \$5.00 reservation fee is due NOW.

Provisional Camp — August 14-20, 1977, at Hart. Cost \$55.00. No age or rank requirements, but you must be a Scout to attend. This is a great opportunity for you to attend camp if your troop cannot go for one reason or another. The camp will provide the leadership as part of the fee.

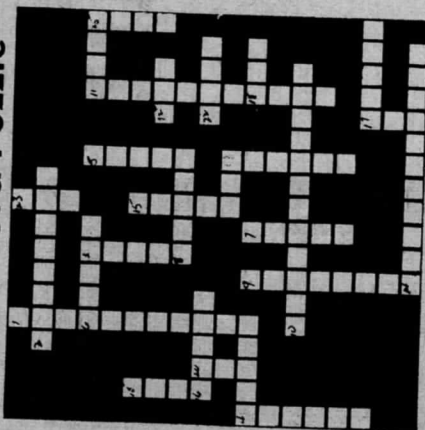

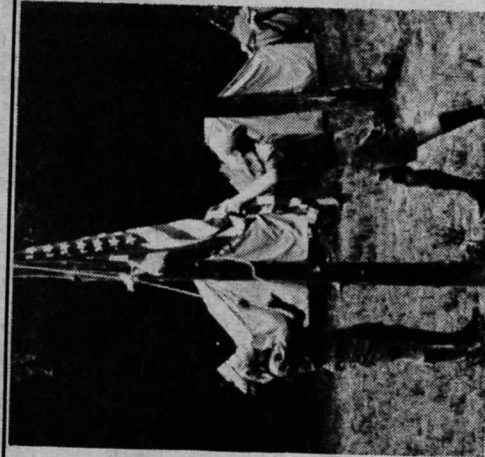
Camp Description

What to Bring

Camp is a great place to be for a week but make sure you've brought what it takes.

Be Sure to Take:

- Necessary**
- () 1 complete summer uniform:
 - () shorts
 - () shirt
 - () neckerchief & slide
 - () knee length socks (with garters) and tabs
 - () hat and belt
 - () underwear (bring enough to last the week)
 - () socks (at least 3 or 4 pair)
 - () shoes for hiking boots
 - () dungarees
 - () shorts or cutoffs
 - () shirts or T-shirts
 - () rubbers or boots
 - () raincoat or poncho (or something to protect you from the "liquid sunshine")
 - () swim trunks (remember — NO CUTOFFS in the pool)
 - () towels
 - () pajamas
 - () sleeping bag or 3 blankets (bring a little pillow if you like)
 - () Jacket and sweater or sweatshirt
 - () medical form (check with your Scoutmaster)
 - () Progress Record Book
 - () Toilet Articles and towels
 - () soap
 - () toothbrush (and some toothpaste)
 - () shampoo
 - () comb
 - () towel
 - () Stamps, envelopes, and paper — by-the-way, postcards are sold at T.P.

 - () Pocketknife (no sheath knives, please)

Camp Administration

Philadelphia Council Camps are owned and operated by the Philadelphia Council, Boy Scouts of America. They are supervised by the council's executive board through the council camping committee, composed of leading citizens from Philadelphia. The camps are directed by full-time adult staff by trained and qualified by the National Camping School of the Boy Scouts of America. The camps are certified annually by the county Boards of Health and the National Council, Boy Scouts of America.

The camps are open to all registered Scouts without regard to race, color, creed, or national origin.

Zany Activities At Camp

Our "Roving Reporter" about Camp reports seeing these "zany" activities occurring last year:

- Catapult attack — using lashings, a tin can and balloons.
- Monkey Bridge — cross a snake filled swamp.
- Signal Tower — Beat the record (45 feet in 14.2 minutes)
- Seaweed fights — ask boathouse crew about this one.
- Canoe trip — down the Delaware in a day!
- Flood down — using life preservers (Eagle Island only)
- Raft Trip — it's a great ride!
- Challenge the Staff — they're equally bad in every sport!
- Outpost camps — for Tenderfoot and Eagle

Trading Post

In between activities, you will probably want to visit the well-stocked Trading Post at either Eagle or Hart. Available there are patches, insignia, and neckerchiefs. Also to help you along with some of your merit badges, you can purchase merit badges pamphlets for any badge offered at camp, and leathercraft, basketry, and woodcarving kits. You can also buy equipment needs such as flashlights, ponchos, mess kits, Scout knives and sharpening stones. But best of all to satisfy an urgent need for a snack, candy, soda, pretzels, potato chips, and ice cream, are also available. Don't forget to redeem your coupon for your first free soda upon arrival at camp, courtesy of Unami Lodge.



Arrival & Departure

Parents and/or troop leaders are responsible for seeing that their Scouts arrive in Camp at 2:00 P.M. on the Sunday afternoon of the scheduled week. The camp week is over the following Saturday morning unless the troop is planning to camp for 2 weeks. Check out is by 11:00 A.M.

Refund Policy

Please note that the \$5.00 registration fee is not refundable. The balance of full fees paid will only be refunded upon (1) nineteen days written notice of the cancellation, or (2) illness or family emergency, or (3) summer school. Written statements are required for (2) and (3) and must be presented promptly to the Camping Office. Refunds will be made within thirty days.

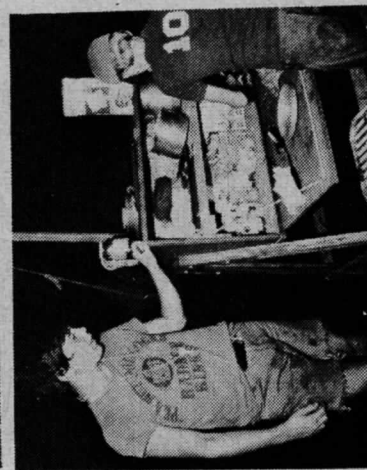
Camp Description

Eagle Island Scout Camp — Is part of the Treasure Island Reservation where the Order of the Arrow was founded in 1915. This Camp is the only Scout Camp in the country located on an island (5 miles above Point Pleasant, Pa. in the middle of the Delaware River.) The Camp features boating, canoeing, and sailing along the Delaware River, surrounded by picturesque cliffs and woodlands.

Hart Scout Reservation — East and West Camps are located on over 500 acres of woodland along picturesque Unami Creek, above Green Lane, Pa. The Camp is equipped and designed for fun. It has an olympic sized swimming pool, the largest rifle range in any Scout Camp, and a two acre lake for boating and canoeing.

The Order of the Arrow

The Order of the Arrow is an honor society of campers, chartered by the National Council, Boy Scouts of America. It recognizes those Scout campers who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law or Explorer Code in their daily lives, and by such recognition cause others to conduct themselves in such a manner as to warrant similar recognition, to promote camping and to crystallize the habit of helpfulness as a life purpose.

Membership Requirements

To become eligible for election, a Scout or Explorer must have the approval of his unit leader prior to the election.

A Scout or Explorer must have fifteen days and nights of camping under the auspices and standards of the Boy Scouts of America. One long-term camp must occur during this two year camping period.

A Scout must have reached First Class at the time of the election, and an active Explorer must have six months tenure with his post.

Adults (over age 18 in a troop, over 21 in a post) are selected by the unit, or by the Lodge Executive Committee in very special instances.

Each Scout Troop and Explorer Post with qualified members, is urged to conduct an election during the course of this year. This election can be held at any time and place that is convenient to you. Although it is strongly recommended that a District-Chapter Election Team conducts the election, any Scoutmaster may do so. If you should decide to conduct the election yourself, it is suggested that you read the Order of the Arrow Handbook concerning the manner in which it is to be run.

To be inducted, those elected must attend either the Lodge's Spring Service or Fall Fellowship Weekends or Summer Camp to take the Ordeal. Until then, they will not be considered members of Unami Lodge. If for some reason they are unable to attend these, they have one year from the date of election to take the Ordeal. No person will be inducted until the Ordeal Chairman has your returned Election Report. When the time comes, you will be informed of the next opportunity they will have for induction. Election forms are available at the Scout Service Center.

Unami Lodge 1 — History

The fledgling Boy Scouts, only five years old in America, has found quick acceptance in Philadelphia. Two years ago, the Philadelphia Council decided to open a summer camp on the Delaware which is now known as Treasure Island. The Camp Committee is in session to determine who will direct the operations of the camp for the coming summer. After much discussion, they name E. Urner Goodman of Troop One as Camp Director, and Carroll A. Edson as Assistant Camp Director.

These two gentlemen agree that there should be some way of emphasizing the ideals of the Scouting movement during summer. Mr. Goodman has been reading a few books in preparation for his stay at T.I. One of these, Cave's Camp Book, describes an organization which is designed to perpetuate certain camp traditions and ideals from summer to summer.

Mr. Goodman, drawing on his work with two fraternal organizations, feels that this might work at T.I. After discussing it with Mr. Edson, the two decide to form a similar organization at the camp. Since it is known that the Delaware Indians used to inhabit the land of the camp, this new organization will be based on the Indian traditions, and a weekly council fire will be held by this group.

Up at T.I. there is a mad rush to complete preparations for the ceremony. Much of the work on the ceremonial grounds cannot be done until the very day of the campfire, due to the complicated matters elsewhere in the camp which have to be handled by the small camp staff. Harry Yoder, a Scouter from Troop Three, assists Mr. Goodman all day Friday in preparing the site. When the camp grows dark, the Scouts are gathered around the flag pole

to the nearby island where they will spend the night sleeping under the stars. On the way, they will be informed of the significance of the different tasks which they performed at the Council Fire. Each action represented a different ideal of the new Wiamachtienk W.W.: Brotherhood, Service, and Cheerfulness. The next day, the candidates receive "sealed orders" which tell them to visit a farmer on the mainland and perform a given job. After completing the task, each candidate is given a new set of orders from the farmer and proceeds to the next farm.

Including Mr. Goodman and Mr. Edson, Unami Lodge has twenty-five members sporting the black sashes with white stripes, which create a striking contrast when seen, at the end of the summer of 1915.

The program continues to be a success at T.I., and gradually, by 1919 (held-up because of the World War), inquiries about it came from other camps. By 1921 there were a 6 lodges in America including a second lodge, Unalactigo, in Philadelphia.

Now in its 61st year of Active Service, Unami has proven itself a leader in Brotherhood. Unami Lodge first: The induction ceremony; the Second Degree ceremony; the Vigil; four National Conferences, a Lodge House for members; Unit Chapter Organization, Camp Promotion and where to go camping guide; annual dinner meeting, Braille handbook for boys, a planned reforestation program; the Old Goats and the founding of Wiamachtienk W.W.

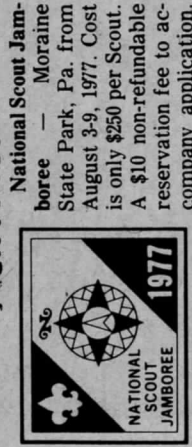

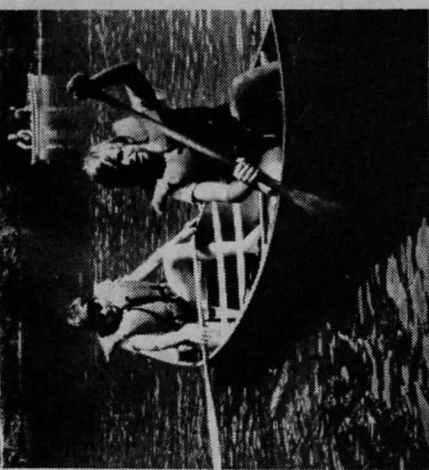


Here's a bonus — a week of summer camp at Treasure Island Reservation, Eagle Island Scout Camp. We arrive at Eagle on July 27 for a week of pre-jamboree training and fun. We leave from Eagle to the Jamboree via air-conditioned bus on August 2, and return home from the Jamboree on August 11. That's 16 straight days chock full of fun and adventure. Equipment and tentage for the Jamboree is being purchased out of Philadelphia Council Capital Funds, to be used at our summer camps after the Jamboree is over. Thus, we have been able to lower the Jamboree fee to \$250 from the higher fee previously announced.

Under the theme "Forward Together, Scouting/USA" this ninth National Scout Jamboree will offer a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to most Scouts. As part of the regional camps program phase, Scouts will compete on a patrol and individuals in the following Scout skill activities: fire by flint and steel; fire by friction; knots and splicing; lashing; metric measurements (estimating in metrics); observation; and orienteering. Winners in each region will be designated, who then will compete for the national championship.

Comprising the framework of the campwide competitive events are an octathlon (an interpatrol competitive activity consisting of a series of eight events designed to test athletic skills); an obstacle course; individual competition in such things as fly casting and log sawing; field sports (action archery, air rifle and slingshot marksmanship); a handicapped Scouting trail; an azimuth trail (meteorology station; signal towers, shelters, to name a few); and waterfront activities (swimming, sailing, rowing and canoeing, fishing, navigation, and marlinspike seamanship or advanced ropework). Also, proposed are activities in conservation / ecology / nature; a merit badge midway; and an arts and sciences fair, as well as a national outdoor cooking and baking contest.

Help Wanted

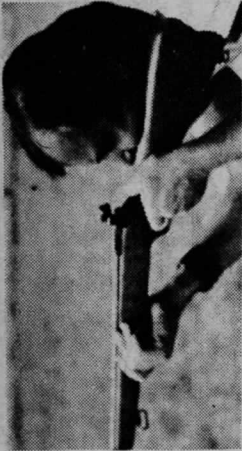
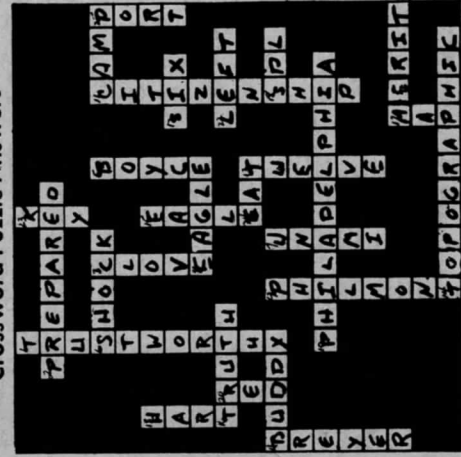
Counselors-In-Training — This is an unusual opportunity for you to learn staff leadership techniques and methods. To be eligible, you must be a Scout of at least First Class and 14 years old by July 1, 1977. You will be interviewed before camp and selections will be made before camp. You may also apply when you are in camp with your troop for a subsequent week.

If selected, you will be assigned to an area of camp operation for one week. You will be related to this area for half a day; the remainder of the day you will continue with your own advancement and interests. The cost is \$20.00 per week. C.I.T.'s will sleep in their own area under staff leadership, and will eat their meals with the camp staff.

Camp Staff — Several openings exist for qualified applicants on the Philadelphia Council Camp Staff at both Hart and Eagle. You may apply for positions in the area of Scoutcraft, Aquatics, Trading Post, Commissary, Field Sports, Quartermaster, Ecology, and O.A. Honorsmaster. You must be dedicated to good camping and willing to endure hard work. The pay isn't great, but you can really have a great time serving our Council. You must be 16 years old by July 1, 1977.
