Well, let's see where we are now. To date, there have been six meetings of the Consolidation Team, and the progress has been remarkable. The members have established a great working relationship, characterized by mutual respect.

At this point, there is a new lodge organization, different from the current structure of either Lodge. This was detailed in our last Voice of the Turtle. A new set of rules governing the operation of the Lodge has been drawn and approved by the committee. For Unami these new rules may seem too simple, but they allow the officers to run the Lodge with more flexibility and freedom than they previously enjoyed. For example, the officers can decide which committees they feel they need during their term of office, none are mandated by the rules! This should also, keep the

Executive meetings shorter! The annual dues have been set at \$6.00; the Lodge year is established at September 1 through August 31. the decision was made to conduct the Vigil Honor candidate selection and ceremony at the individual Lodge level this year instead of doing it as a consolidated Lodge. This is consistent with an earlier decision to complete this year as two separate, independent Lodges. These are all significant decisions as we move toward the consolidation of the two Lodges.

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Spring Service Is Almost Upon Us

The Spring Service will be held on May17-19 at Treasure Island Scout Reservation. Check in will be from 6pm until 8:45pm. This year will feature a music theme. Anybody with a costume along this theme is encouraged to bring it. There will be plenty of games and prizes and also some Karaoke so arrowmen can sing along to their favorite hits. However, we can't forget the purpose of the weekend and that is SERVICE. There will be plenty of work projects to be completed and cheerful service is what makes the lodge run. So plan on coming out to the Spring Service and look forward to a great weekend.

Plans are being made for a major one-day event to be held at the Hart - Delmont reservation. A committee has been formed and is, currently, developing a program for the day. A full day of activities is being planned, including the announcement of the name of our consolidated Lodge. A re-dedication ceremony of the rebuilt Delmont Lodge house which was destroyed by fire a number of years ago will also take place. All members of Delmont and Unami are invited to attend the ceremony. The highlight of the day will be the election of officers for the 1996-1997 Lodge year. Food will be served, the candidates will deliver their speeches, and time will be allocated to question the candidates. Everyone from both Lodges is invited to attend; this will be a great opportunity to meet your brothers from Delmont Lodge, 43. The committee is hoping for a BIG turnout to this event! Keep tuned for more information on this event.

As mentioned above, the election of officers for the 1996-1997 will be conducted on June 15, 1996. A Nominations Committee has been formed to develop a list of candidates; from this list a full slate of officers will be elected. Some preliminary guidelines have been established for this first election because

many members will not be familiar with all of the candidates. For example, the new Lodge Chief and the Lodge Executive Vice-Chief will be elected so that each of the original Lodges is represented in the two most senior positions, and the three vice-chiefs will be elected only by members of their respective fields. The mechanics of how the election will be conducted and monitored is still being decided.

At our last meeting there was a lengthy discussion concerning our individual Lodge Dinners. The discussion focused on getting more youth members to the dinner. It should be emphasized that this is a major concern of the youth leadership of the two Lodges, not just the adults! Both Lodges seem to have the same problem - too many more adults than youth at the dinner. We discussed everything from cost to location to menu to the program and entertainment. No decisions have been made, and the topic is significant enough to warrant further discussion. "What about the Lodge name and number?", you may ask. Our last meeting concluded with each youth member stating his opinion about what the name should be and reasons supporting his opinion. Time did not permit a lengthy discussion. This topic will be the focus of our next meeting. As you can imagine, this is a difficult and emotion decision and will have the longest-lasting result. It is our identity! Organizational structures,

rules, events, etc. can be changed easily, but that is not true of the name of our Lodge. Your representatives are taking this issue very seriously.

What other topics must be addressed? Well, some which have been identified are: how often do we need Lodge Executive meetings, where should they be held, should time limits be enforced on all meetings, what traditions of each of the original Lodges should be retained, how many Vigil Honor ceremonies per year, how is the Vigil Honor ceremony - including the call-out - to be conducted, how many work weekends will the Lodge sponsor, etc.

While the level of detail in this update may seem excessive to you, it is provided for two reasons. First, it is important to realize that the committee wants you to be as well informed as is possible. Nothing is being hidden from the total membership of the Lodge. Second, this consolidation is the work of the youth members, not the Lodge or Council adult lay or professional leadership. Our youth leaders deserve your continued support and encouragement as they work to complete this merger. And, they are to be commended for their outstanding efforts to date.

Well, that's all for this time. Stay alert for more information.

River Road Closed! How to get to Treasure Island...

Effective March 18th, sections of River Rd.—PA RT. 32 will be closed until July or later to repair flood damaged portions of the road. The official detour posted by PENNDOT is 19 miles long. Much of the work to be done is near the island. From week to week, the sections closed will be different. Here are some tips on the best ways to get here from there.

For most of the road work, the best approach to TI will be from the North. Follow RT. 29 in NJ to Frenchtown, cross the river and come south on PA 32 about 3 miles to TI. If the road is closed at Dark Hollow, make a right. Go to Cafferty, make a left. Go to Smithtown, make a left, down to the river, make another left, go about 1/2 mile to TI.

If you are coming from RT. 611 or RT. 413 in PA. Stay on 611 N. or 413 N. until you come to the town of Pipersville. Pick up Dark Hollow Rd. at the 4-way stop and follow Dark Hollow to the river. If the section south of Dark Hollow is posted as

closed, see the above directions.

If you somehow still end up in Point Pleasant and are faced with a Road Closed sign, bear left at the Church in Pt. Pleasant onto Cafferty Rd. This parallels River Rd. Connect with either Smithtown Rd. (a potholed, gravel road on a good day) or go to the stop at Dark Hollow Rd. Turn right, go to the river, turn right, TI is 1/2 mile.

Unfortunately, we will not know which sections of the road will be closed from which direction until it happens! Follow detour signs, and we will try to post signs at the detours.

Lodge Adviser's Message...

We are on the brink of a very busy time of the year for the Lodge! Our spring work weekends are scheduled and after the tough winter, our camps need a lot of work. Beginning this year we have the opportunity to serve twice as many camps as before. We now include Resica Falls and Camp Delmont as well as Hart and Treasure Island. This gives us more choices to select a weekend which is convenient with our schedule as well as a choice of camps to serve. This is our responsibility - to support and maintain our camps - don't neglect it!

The day is being planned by brothers from both Unami and Delmont and will include some games/sport activities, a re-dedication of a building at Camp Delmont and some food, in addition to the election of officers.

Summer camp at Hart, Resica Falls and Treasure Island will take place in July and early August. we can still continue

to promote long-term camping with our units. Remember that until every Scout in every unit is signed up for summer camp, our camp promotion job is not finished.

A couple of weeks later, we're right into September with a new Lodge and a new lodge year. Sounds busy? It is, and it's going to be fun-filled and exciting. So plan to get involved and have a great time! You'll, also, experience a sense of accomplishment as each task is finished.

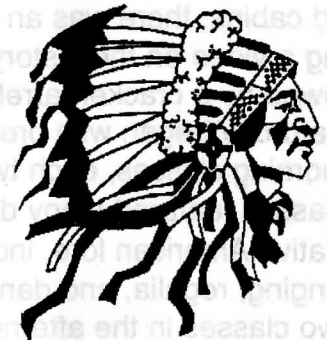
Our troops are beginning to gear up for our Summer Season and I hope unit visitations are being done to follow through with Unit Elections.

NEW CEREMONIAL REGALIA TO DEBUT AT SPRING SERVICE

After substantial research on the culture and customs of the Lenni-Lenape, John Grandzol, Advisor for the Lodge Ceremonial Committee, has designed new costumes for use in all lodge ceremonies. Based on the earliest accounts of European contact with these Native Americans, including those of the Moravian missionaries and William Penn, it is apparent that the "typical" Indian garb so common in movies and TV does not accurately represent the original inhabitants of this area. Likewise, until later in their history, the Lenni-Lenape did not have close ties with the Iroquois Confederacy. The new costumes are an attempt at authenticity, despite the lack of photographs and very few sketches on which to base them.

Each member of the ceremonial team will wear light-colored, deerskin-like leggings with antler button reinforcements, front and back fringed aprons, a vest fringed at the shoulders, and moccasins. The front apron has the Unami One turtle logo in black, red, and green dyed into the leather. The vest is adorned with grouse and wild turkey feather cluster (imitation eagle or wild turkey) decorated with leather spots, bone hairpipe, coyote claws or cowrie shells. Participants will also wear earrings and necklaces made of the same artifacts as well as beaver

teeth. These costumes are rather plain compared to the grand regalia of other tribes, but therein lies their beauty. Constructed from large hides of pigskin, they are extremely lightweight (important for summer use), durable, and easy to care for. Mr. Grandzol has hand-made two complete sets of these costumes, one for Treasure Island and one for Hart.

As part of the new look, the lodge has also purchased two new drums from the Taos drum factory in New Mexico. They, too, will have the Unami design, thanks to Dawn-Alise Grandzol, the artist who created the template and dyed all the aprons as well.

Given the expense in money and time, all participants in ceremonies must realize their responsibility for care of these costumes to ensure their lasting quality. Storage lockers will be in place at each camp. Come to the Spring Service to see this new regalia.

The Ceremonial Committee is chaired by Vida Bey, advised by John Grandzol, and has Antoine Skinner, Brian Hoffman, Christian Grandzol, Mike Leinert, Matt Cowden, Mike Kelly, and Chris Berk as members.

Unami Dances It Up At The Section Pow-Wow

On the 8th, 9th, and 10th, of March, Section NE-4B held a Pow-Wow at the Pine Tree Environmental Center in Tabernacle, New Jersey. Participants from Unami Lodge included John Grandzol, Ceremonies Advisor, Vida Bey, Ceremonies Chairman, Matt Cowden and Christian Grandzol, both Ceremonies Committee members, Brian Hoffman, editor of the Voice, Bob Ostrowski, Dan Acker, Tyson Gerhart, and Chris Smith (from troop 251). After arriving Friday night and setting up in comfortable, heated cabins, there was an opening session featuring a video on the history of the Pow-Wow, followed by a crackerbarrel later that night. Saturday began with breakfast followed by two morning classes, each two hours long. These classes featured many different aspects of Native American lore, including beadwork, singing, regalia, and dancing. There were also two classes in the afternoon. After dinner, and a brief presentation on the Lenni-Lenape, the Pow-Wow was held in the conference center. Many

participants arrived in full or partial dance regalia, and the dancing was complemented by a Northern-style drum. The festivities lasted several hours after which followed another crackerbarrel.

Unami Lodge was well represented, with three of its members assisting in class instruction or presentation. Vida wore the new ceremonial outfit while everyone in the contingent participated fully in the dancing. This promises to be an annual event, so watch for it next year and come along.

NATIONAL GETS TOUGH ON "ARROWMEN IN BARS"

The National Order of the Arrow Committee firmed up its position on how its members are viewed in bars. Unfortunately, those who are not directly involved will also feel repercussions of their actions. Local Lodges have been left to enforce these National mandates.

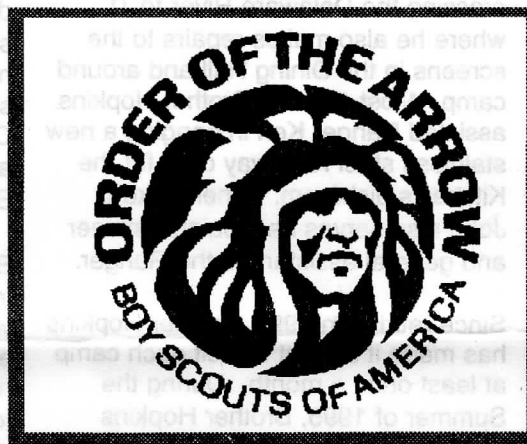
Arrowmen who are uncertain as to where they fall in this Order are asked to immediately contact their Chapter Chief or Chapter Adviser. Should this article continue to baffle, befuddle, confuse, perplex, and leave you with a general feeling of unconsciousness, call. Call them! Call them now!

This Order begins with Unami Lodge launching a full scale investigation into any involvement that would link any of our members to National's Task Force on Arrowmen In Bars. Individual background checks as well as rumor, rhetoric, and hearsay sadly indicate that Unami Lodge indeed has a widespread involvement problem with arrowmen in bars. Both youth and adults have been found entering and staying for longer periods than the ten months afforded by the National Committee. This investigation has discovered that there is an overwhelmingly higher percentage of youth now linked with the Task Force. Under the "Right to Privacy" Act the names of the offenders can not be published at this time. To further determine whether your name may or may not appear in the

Official Task Force Journals, Unami Lodge offers you the following indicators as a true measure of your DEGREE of involvement in the Order:

Indicator One: Did you take your Ordeal and so register with Unami Lodge, One prior to and including Summer Camp of 1996.

Indicator Two: If you answered yes to Indicator one, then you are an Ordeal Member who is eligible to Seal the Bond. Earn your BARS and attain the degree of Brotherhood at the upcoming

Indicator Three: If you are unaware of your rights and privileges of being an Ordeal member for ten months or more then an explanation of these rights and privileges are entitled to you. You may collect this explanation oddly enough during the weekend of May 17-19, 1996 at T.I. or should you feel strongly

enough to exercise your option to know immediately, you may collect what is owed to you by contacting your chapter chief or chapter adviser by phone, by mail, by E-mail, by any and all means at your disposal. (At a chapter meeting would truly be a treat for the senses.)

There are two main degrees within the Order of the Arrow. First your degree of involvement within our Lodge and Chapters: 1: Do you help keep the "outing in Scouting" in your home unit? 2: Do you participate in your Chapter's program as well as attend Lodge events? 3: Do you have your Chapter Chief and or Adviser's phone numbers on your speed dial?

The second degree within the Order is your actual degree (Ordeal, Brotherhood or Vigil).

The National Order of the Arrow Committee has indeed firmed up its position on Ordeal members Sealing the Bond (Arrowmen in Bars). After you look over the Brotherhood Requirements (found on pages 51-56 of the current Order of the Arrow Handbook - 1992 Edition item number #634996), it is hoped that you will understand that once a member has this knowledge he will have a better understanding of who and what a true arrowman really is. "Today's preparation determines tomorrow's achievement."

In this edition of the Voice of The Turtle, we would like to recognize Brother John Hopkins mainly for what we had already known about him in his service to our camps.

However, upon researching this arrowman we were pleasantly surprised to discover that Brother Hopkins service to our camps is but one of many examples of his Scouting resolve. Brother Hopkins is currently registered as a Frontier District Unit Commissioner as well as the IR for the pack he started, Pack 279 of Our Lady of Ransom Church.

We know of Brother Hopkins largely from our Camp Staff experiences. Beginning with the Annual Frontier District Cub Adventure Weekend at Camp Hart, where he began serving as the events coordinator in 1989 to the present. Then we would see Brother Hopkins leading his crew during year round weekends at Hart and TI, running the Rifle Range, Trading Post, and checking Units in and out of camp. We now know this as being a Campmaster. Brother Hopkins became a Philadelphia Council Campmaster Corps Crew Chief in 1986 and continues this service today. Sure enough, the more we were in camp thru the OA or Camp Staff, there's Brother Hopkins. When we asked our Camp Rangers (Ken &



Rick), "What does John do when he is in camp?" We were stunned at the responses to our question. Well at Hart, Brother Hopkins has done and continues to make repairs to all the screens, Dining Hall doors and Windows, Family Cabin doors and windows as well as securing the donation of the storm doors currently hanging on the Family Cabins. Brother Hopkins also engineered the layout and then routed a new campsign for Hart, bearing our new Council's name. Brother Hopkins can also be found crossing the Delaware River to TI where he also makes repairs to the screens in the Dining Hall and around camp. Most recently Brother Hopkins assisted Ranger Ken in hanging a new stainless steel roll-away door for the Kitchen's dishroom. When asked, John also serves as a painter-stainer and general assistant to the Ranger.

Since retiring in 1994, Brother Hopkins has made it a point to visit each camp at least once a month. During the Summer of 1995, Brother Hopkins triple dipped into the Council's Summer Camp Program. He continued to bolster TI's Handicraft program by serving

as the Handicraft Director for the two weeks the regular director was at Philmont. Then he continued directing the Frontier District Cub Adventure

weekend at Camp Hart. Then he went back to Hart to run the "This Old Camp" specialty camp. He has been a TI Camp Staff Volunteer commissioner for the last 4 summers. Brother Hopkins has also made the time to serve as the Frontier District Youth Protection Chairman from 1994 thru the present as well as serving as his district Annual Dinner Chairman in 1995 and 1996. Over his 27 years, John has been an ASM with Troop 1/. In 1982 they nominated John to the OA, where he kept his Ordeal at TI during Summer Camp. The following summer while camping with his unit, he Sealed the Bond. He has also served as the Frontier Training Chairman between 1980-1987 as well as the Cub Roundtable Staff from September 1977 till the present.

Because of his tireless efforts and leadership to the Frontier District as well as, his valuable time, skill, and energy to do whatever we need of him, The Voice of the Turtle would like to thank Brother Hopkins and introduce him to you, if you haven't already seen him in camp.

VIGIL HONOR NOMINATION FORM

THE VIGIL HONOR

The Vigil Honor is the highest honor that a Lodge can bestow upon a member. It dates back to 1915 when our Founder, Dr. E. Urner Goodman, became the first Vigil Honor member. It is a mark of high distinction and is reserved for those arrowmen who have given exceptional service by helping others above and beyond the call of duty. The Vigil Honor requires unselfish dedication to one or more of the following: the Lodge, the Order of the Arrow, Scouting, or the Scout Camp. The Vigil is a recognition of one's commitment to altruistic leadership and proper example of Brotherhood in Cheerful Service. Alertness to the needs of others is a mark of the Vigil Honor.

Nominations for the Vigil Honor ought to be taken seriously. You, the nominator, must provide as much information about the nominee as possible. In this way the Vigil Honor Committee can make a fair assessment of the contributions of the nominee to the Lodge and Scouting. To be eligible for nomination an arrowman must be a member in good standing of Unami Lodge, One and must be a Brotherhood member for at least two years.

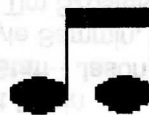

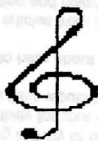

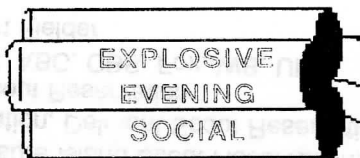
