

INSIGNIA FOR EXPLORERS AND LEADERS
ATTENDING THE JUBILEE JAMBOREE

The following regulations pertaining to the wearing of insignia should be observed by all official delegations to the Jubilee Jamboree in England this summer. They are based upon those appearing in the booklet, Exploring Official Uniforms and Insignia, No. 3078 (1955 edition).

GREEN V-Neck shirt

SHOULDER INSIGNIA: The regulation white on red community and state strip, or white on red local council strip or patch.

VETERAN UNIT: The silver bar flush with top of unit numeral.

UNIT NUMERAL: The regulation white on red unit numeral, 2" below shoulder seam.

BADGE OF OFFICE: Explorer badge of office, 4" below shoulder seam. If troop badge of office is worn, it is worn 4" below shoulder seam or 1/2" below Explorer badge of office. National and local council Scouters will wear their embroidered badge of office as prescribed, 4" below the shoulder seam. Only one badge of office should be worn by Scouters.

LEFT BREAST: See page 30 of Exploring - Official Uniforms and Insignia.

LEFT POCKET: Embroidered badge of rank centered. If Boy Scout badge of rank is worn, it is worn just below the Explorer badge of rank, excepting in the case of Eagle. The Eagle embroidered badge is worn above Explorer badge of rank. The Star Scout badge is now available with green background.

RIGHT BREAST: Former national or world jamboree patch. Only one patch allowed. No other badge authorized for this position.

RIGHT POCKET: B.S.A. world jamboree patch plus Order of the Arrow insignia suspended from button or covering flap.

RIGHT SLEEVE: Explorer universal medallion 2" below shoulder, unit achievement patch 1/2" below, Emergency Service patch 1/2" below universal medallion or achievement patch, musician 1/2" below medallion or lowest insignia.

SERVICE STARS: See page 11 Exploring - Official Uniforms and Insignia.

JAC-SHIRT

LEFT POCKET: The universal Explorer medallion centered.

RIGHT POCKET: B.S.A. world jamboree patch.

No other insignia may be worn on the jac-shirt except the Philmont black bull by those entitled.

NECKERCHIEFS

Jamboree: Each Explorer and leader will be furnished three Boy Scouts of America official jamboree neckerchiefs, one of which should be worn at the jamboree site.

Informal Occasions (en route to and from England): Units or regions may design a distinctive neckerchief for the jamboree party. This may contain special "regional" insignia but not the regional patch as such.

MERIT BADGE SASHES

For regulations pertaining to the wearing of merit badge sashes, see page 25, Exploring - Official Uniforms and Insignia.

ORDER OF THE ARROW SASHES

To be worn only when prescribed by the director of the contingent.

SOME RECENT REGULATIONS AFFECTING JAMBOREE PARTICIPANTS

LOCAL COUNCIL SHOULDER INSIGNIA: The Executive Board approved the following recommendations:

That the wearing of distinctive local council and district patches in place of the prescribed white on red insignia be disapproved.

That the executive board of the local council may authorize the entire uniformed personnel of the local council (boys and leaders) to wear the present local council strip or patch on the left sleeve in place of the prescribed community and state strips.

That with the broadening of the use of the local council strip to include all personnel, it will not be necessary hereafter to devise special insignia for local council delegations to jamborees or other mass activities.

INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE BADGE: Scouters of the Boy Scouts of America who are members of the Boy Scouts International Committee or who are officially related to the work of the committee may wear the embroidered badge of the committee centered on the left pocket of the uniform coat and shirt. This insignia may also be worn on the point of a royal purple neckerchief in accordance with international usage.

REGIONAL PATCHES: Leaders Only. Page 34, Exploring - Official Uniforms and Insignia.

SCOUTERS AND BOY BADGES: Scouters over twenty-one years of age are urged to refrain from wearing boy insignia such as den chief tabs and cords, merit badge sashes, attendance pins, and contest medals. This shall not be construed as prohibiting a Scouter from wearing his Eagle, Quartermaster, or Explorer Silver awards and related embroidered insignia on appropriate occasions.
