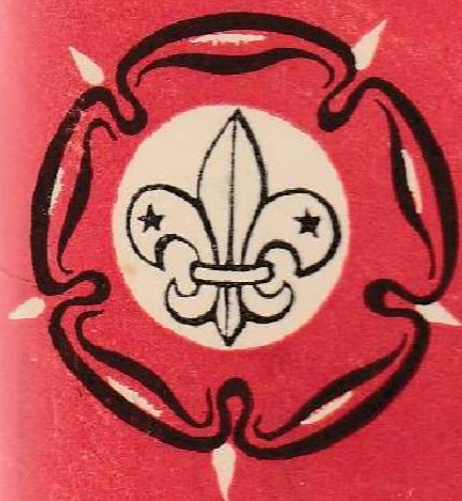

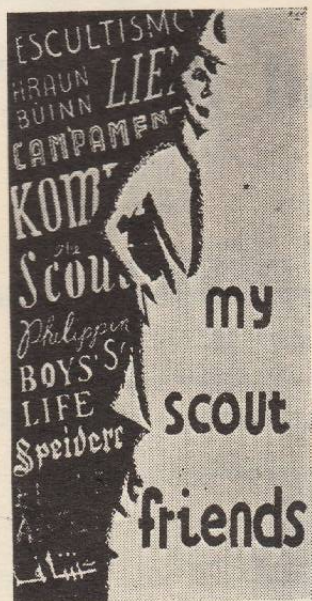

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J.I.M. EMBLEM

THE emblem of the Jubilee Jamboree is the red Tudor Rose of England. It was chosen, first because England was the birthplace of Scouting, and secondly because Sutton Park, where the Jamboree is being held, was given to the citizens of Sutton Coldfield in the year 1528 by the great Tudor King of England, Henry VIII.



The golden Scout badge displayed in the heart of the rose typifies the Scout Jamboree being held in the heart of England.

Every Scout will know the magic initials B.-P. and remember with gratitude our Founder, Robert Baden-Powell, the centenary of whose birth we are celebrating in this Jamboree as well as the Jubilee of Scouting.

SUTTON PARK

FOR the next 12 days you will be living in historic Sutton Park, and as it will be your home for that time you will want to know something of the story of the place.

Sutton Park was once a royal hunting forest, and it was given to the people of Sutton Coldfield by King Henry VIII in 1528.

The park extends over 2,400 acres of woods and moorland in undulating country with heather, gorse, and running streams and attractive lakes. It has been preserved in its natural state and is a sanctuary for wild life.

Within the park boundaries is an ancient highway built by the Romans when they occupied Britain more than 2,000 years ago. There are also some prehistoric earthworks in which many relics have been found.

The citizens of Sutton Coldfield are justly proud of their park, and we are indeed fortunate in being granted its use for our Jamboree. Scouts of the United Kingdom have promised, on behalf of their Brother Scouts of the world, to do everything within their power to preserve the beauties of the park.

SWIMMING

PLACES. You may swim in;

Keeper's Pool

Blackroot Pool

Powell's Pool

N.E. side of Bracebridge Pool

You may NOT swim or bathe in Longmoor Pool or Windley Pool.

TIMES. Swimming is not permitted before 07.30 hours or after 20.00 hours each day. On Sundays swimming will not be permitted while religious services are in progress.

Keeper's Pool is reserved for J.I.M. campers until 12.00 each day. The general public will be admitted at other times.

Blackroot Pool is not available for swimming before 10.30 hours each day.

SAFETY PRECAUTIONS. The 'Buddy' system of swimming will operate. Scouts pair off before entering the water together. From time to time a member of the Camp Staff on duty will give a whistle signal which is answered by each pair of 'Buddies' joining hands and raising them.

It is not wise to swim for at least one hour after eating a meal.

NO PERSON SHOULD SWIM WITHOUT FIRST OBTAINING PERMISSION FROM HIS SCOUTER.

CHANGING FACILITIES. Changing facilities are only available at Keeper's Pool, and these are limited. Campers should, therefore, go to the pools with trunks under their shorts. Women campers in the Indaba will use the changing facilities at Keeper's Pool.

EMERGENCY. In case of an emergency or accident at the Pools the Camp Police should be notified at once.

MESURES DE SÉCURITÉ. Un système de natation par paires sera adopté. Les Scouts se grouperont deux par deux avant d'entrer dans l'eau ensemble. De temps en temps, un membre du Personnel du Camp, qui sera de service, donnera un coup de sifflet auquel chaque paire de nageurs répondra en joignant les mains et en les levant.

CAS D'URGENCE. En cas d'urgence ou d'accident, la Police du Camp devrait être avertie immédiatement.



YOUR HEALTH

SHOULD you be unfortunate enough to fall ill or sustain an injury at the Jamboree, an efficient Medical Service has been arranged for you.

FIRST AID. A First Aid Post is available in each Sub-Camp Headquarters area. If you have cuts, bruises, or burns go at once to the First Aid Post. Proper care will ensure that your injuries heal quickly.

MEDICAL. If you feel ill report sick to your Scouter. There will be a qualified doctor in attendance at the First Aid Post in your Sub-Camp at the following times:

Morning: 07.30 to 08.30 hours.

Evening: 17.00 to 18.00 hours.

In cases of emergency doctors are always on call, so you can have proper attention at any time.

If you are seriously ill you will be taken to a National Health Hospital in Birmingham.

ACCIDENTS. Should you witness a serious accident which calls for an ambulance for the patient, report it at once to a Sub-Camp First Aid Post or the Hospital, whichever is nearest, so that it can be dealt with at once.

TEETH. Should you suffer from toothache during the camp or need other emergency dental treatment, report to your Scouter. Dentists are available in the Camp Hospital.

All the facilities of the National Health Service are available to you and you will not have to pay for any medicine or treatment you receive.

The Medical Services are there to keep you fit so that you may enjoy the Jamboree to the full. Do not hesitate to make use of them if you need them.

ACCIDENTS. Si vous étiez témoin d'un accident sérieux nécessitant une ambulance pour la victime, signalez-le immédiatement au Poste de Secours du Sous-Camp ou à l'Hôpital, selon que l'un ou l'autre est le plus près, de façon à ce que les dispositions nécessaires puissent être prises immédiatement.

SOINS DENTAIRES. Si vous souffrez de maux de dents pendant la durée du camp, ou si vous avez besoin d'autres soins dentaires urgents, signalez-le à votre Chef de Troupe. Des dentistes sont disponibles à l'Hôpital du Camp.

Ablutions (Ablutions)

There are six ablution areas in your Sub-Camp and you will be told by your Sub-Camp Chief which one you will use. They contain washplaces, showers, and latrines. Please keep these areas clean and tidy.



Do not throw anything down the drains. Waste water and sewage is pumped to the main sewers by electric pumps, which will be damaged or jammed by rubbish. Dustbins are provided for this.

Drinking water taps are provided at each area. Do not wash dishes or pots under these taps.

Arena (Arène)

The seats in the covered grandstands are reserved for ticket holders during afternoon performances. They are available for you to use for the Camp Cinema, and during Arena rehearsals. The main grandstand seats are reserved for ticket holders during evening shows. The standing room on the open stands is available for your use at all times. (See 'Cinema', page 48.)

Arena Shows (Spectacles dans l'Arène)

In addition to the usual afternoon displays by contingents in the Arena some special evening shows have been arranged. See Diary pages.

Autographs (Autographes)

It is good to keep names and addresses of Scout friends but it is not courteous to trouble people by asking for autographs.

Badge, J.I.M. (Insigne, J.I.M.). See under 'J'—J.I.M. Badge, page 55.

Banks (Banques)

There are branches of Barclays, Lloyds, Midland, National Provincial, Westminster, Martin's, and District Banks in the Shopping Centre. Barclays have a branch in the Rover Moot and Westminster in the Indaba.

Banks will be open from 12.00 noon to 18.00 hours on 29 July; on other days, hours will be 10.00 to 18.00 hours; Sundays 14.00 to 18.00 hours; banks will close at 12.00 noon on 14 August.

Bathing (Bains). See 'Swimming', page 42.

Bicycles (Bicyclettes)

Because of the risk of accidents and the large numbers of people in Camp only authorized members of the staff and the newspaper sellers may ride bicycles in Sutton Park.

Bounds (Limites)

The whole park is at your disposal, but please keep off the Golf Course greens and the private property of people living near to the park.

Branding (Impression au Fer Chaud)

There is an official Jamboree Camp Brand and you can have your belt, hat-band, etc., branded for 1d. Your Sub-Camp notice-board will tell you the times for this service.

Broadcasting (Radiodiffusion)

You may use radio receivers in the Camp but not after Lights Out or while religious services are being held in the Sub-Camps.

Camp Fires (Feux de Camp)

There will be no J.I.M. camp fires. Camp fires will be held in the Sub-Camps, the Indaba and the Moot on various evenings. This will be your chance to learn new songs and stunts. Your Sub-Camp H.Q. will welcome offers of items for the programme.

Camp Newspaper (Journal du Camp)

The Camp newspaper, *Jubilee Journal*, will be on sale every morning except Sundays at breakfast-time in Sub-Camps—price 6d. (See also 'Newspapers', page 59.)

Camp Police (Police du Camp)

The Camp Police Headquarters is in the Camp Centre. The Scout Police will wear armbands (see 'Staff', page 39). They are there to help you in every possible way, and their instructions must be obeyed.



Camp Site Guard (Garde de l'Emplacement du Camp)

Your Camp Site should not be left empty. A Camp guard should be left on duty in each camp, but if this is difficult ask someone to watch your site when it is left unoccupied. Tell Sub-Camp Headquarters when the whole troop is away from its site.

Cars, Motor-cycles, and other vehicles (Automobiles, Motocyclottes, et autres vehicules)

Campers bringing their own vehicles must park them in the following car parks:

- (a) Jamboree—car park north of Arena.
- (b) Indaba—parking area north-east of Banners Gate.
- (c) Moot—parking area adjacent to the Moot entrance.

Any camper wishing to use his vehicle must obtain a permit from his Sub-Camp Headquarters and use the gate indicated on this pass.

Cinema (Cinéma)

There is an open-air Camp Cinema in the Arena. Admission is free (see 'Arena', page 46.). For details of times of film showings, see 'Diary' pages. There is also a Mobile Cinema operating in the Camp at certain times.

Cleanliness (Propreté)

Good campers keep their camp sites clean and tidy at all times. Please leave the ablution areas as you would wish to find them (see 'Ablutions', page 46).

Your Sub-Camp Chief may ask you for help in cleaning the area and roads near your site; we know you will do this willingly.

Currency (Monnaie). See page 71.

Daily Orders (Ordres du Jour). See 'Instructions', page 53.

Developing and Printing Service (Service de Développement et Tirage)

A service for developing and printing films (but not ciné-camera films) has been arranged. Films may be brought to the receiving office in one of the T.V. tents in your Sub-Camp between the hours 10.15/12.45 and 13.15/16.00. Contact or enprints only will be made. Prints will be ready in two or three days. A deposit of 2s. per film must be paid.

Ciné-camera films should be taken to one of the photographic shops in the Shopping Centre.

Displays (Présentations)

Your Contingent Leader or Sub-Camp Programme Chief will tell you when you are required for rehearsal and performances of your display. For details of times of all displays see the Daily Programme.

Dress (Habillement)

While in the Camp you may wear any type of camp costume so long as you are decently dressed. Outside Sutton Park correct Scout uniform will be worn at all times.

Electricity (Électricité)

DO NOT TOUCH ANY ELECTRICAL INSTALLATIONS, POLES, CABLES OR WIRES.

Enquiries (Renseignements)

There is an Information Office in the Shopping Centre, but before going there try your Sub-Camp Headquarters; they will probably be able to tell you what you want to know.

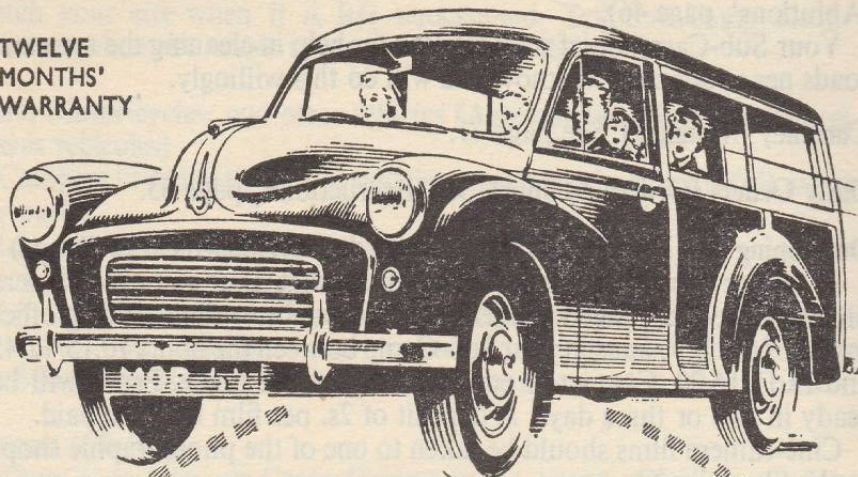

Fire (Feu)

If fire breaks out shout 'Fire!' and tell Sub-Camp Headquarters quickly.

Before the Camp Fire Fighting Service arrives try to beat out the flames and organise water bucket chains.

When the Camp Fire Fighting Service receives an alarm a loud siren will be sounded. This is a warning to all campers to keep clear of the roadways to allow the appliances a free passage.

Unless the Fire Service ask for your help please keep away and do not cause an obstruction.

Fire Precautions (Precautions Contre le Feu)

Campers will take the following precautions against fire:

Keep kerosene and inflammable materials in a safe place.

Put out cooking fires properly before leaving Camp or going to bed.

Do not bury hot ashes; this may start a fire underground.

Make a simple fire beater from an old sack or something similar and keep it in a prominent position.

Do not use naked lights near tents.

NOTE: Naked lights are not permitted in tents.

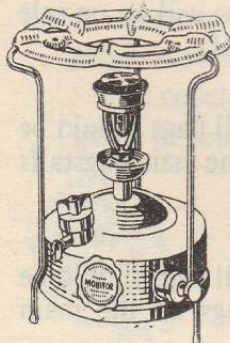

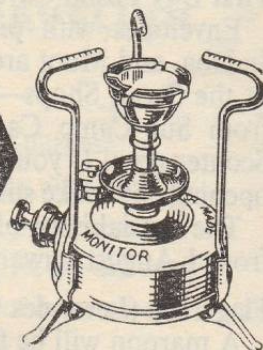

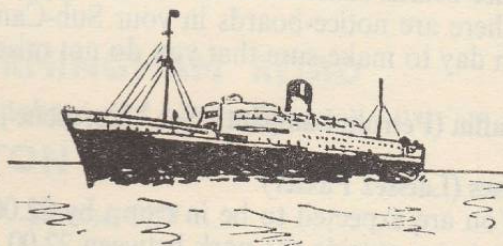

After completion of training as a student apprentice with the Company, ultimate employment may be offered in Research, Design, Production, Outside Construction or Commercial Engineering in any of the many fields in which the Company is active. Academic training is an integral part of the scheme which is operated on a 'Sandwich' basis in conjunction with Rugby College of Technology and Arts.

Prospective candidates may be invited to see something of the Company's work and to discuss their careers with members of the staff of the Education Department at Rugby even if they may not have reached the stage of making formal application.

Similar training schemes are also available in Physics and Chemistry.

Rations (Rations)

Rations will be collected daily from Sub-Camp H.Q. They will be issued on a Troop Unit basis.

Baskets will be issued for carrying your food from the Food Issuing Depots to your site. You will use these baskets throughout the Camp, so take care of them.

Milk will be issued in 1-pint bottles; empty bottles must be returned to the Food Issuing Depots each day. If you have the misfortune to break a bottle take care to remove the glass so that no one gets hurt.

Please do not waste food—that is bad Scouting.

If you need extra food to entertain guests you can buy it at your Sub-Camp Cash Catering Stores. Remember that you will have to order it in advance to be sure of getting it.

Refuse (Ordures)

Destroy as much refuse as possible by burning on kitchen fires. Other dry refuse will be placed in bins on the site. (Tins should be flattened after burning.)

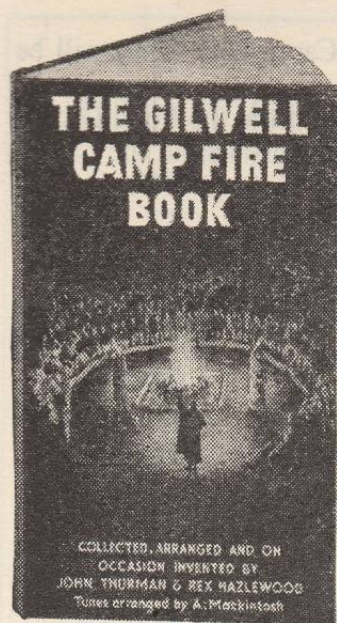
A collection vehicle will visit Sub-Camps each morning between 08.00 and 09.00 hours.

Keep your bin clean and do not use it for wet refuse. Disinfect your bin by burning a small amount of paper or cardboard in it. Keep the lid on tightly at all times.

Details of central services are given in the Diary pages. There are daily religious observances in each Sub-Camp (see Sub-Camp noticeboards for details). There will be a period of quiet each day from 10.00 to 10.05 hours for Unit prayers.

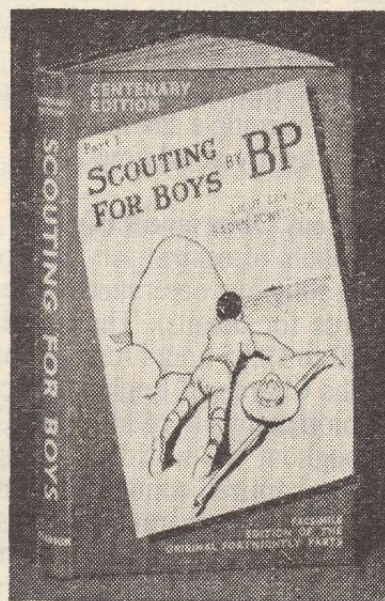

Visitors will be admitted daily after 12.00 hours. The gates of the park will be closed at 22.00 hours.

Water (Eau)

Please do not waste water; a good Scout will turn off all taps after use.

Please do not wash under running taps.

You must not wash pots and dishes at water taps.

Draw your drinking water from the taps in the ablution areas.

The lake water is not fit for drinking.

Please report any water leaks or breakdowns to the nearest Sub-Camp H.Q.



Waste Water (Eau Sale)

Each Troop will dig a sump pit on its site for waste water and liquid refuse. The pit should be covered with a grease trap, which should be replaced at least once every day. The old cover should be burned.

Wood (Bois)

Firewood will be drawn from Sub-Camp Firewood Dumps. Gadget wood will also be drawn from these Dumps except where special timber has been ordered in advance; this will be available at Sub-Camp Headquarters.

Casualty faking using putty and grease paint has played an important part in First Aid training during recent years. Although very effective, the difficulty is that a considerable amount of time is spent in modelling the wounds and they are ultimately destroyed when treatment and bandaging take place.
